We thought we had it made.

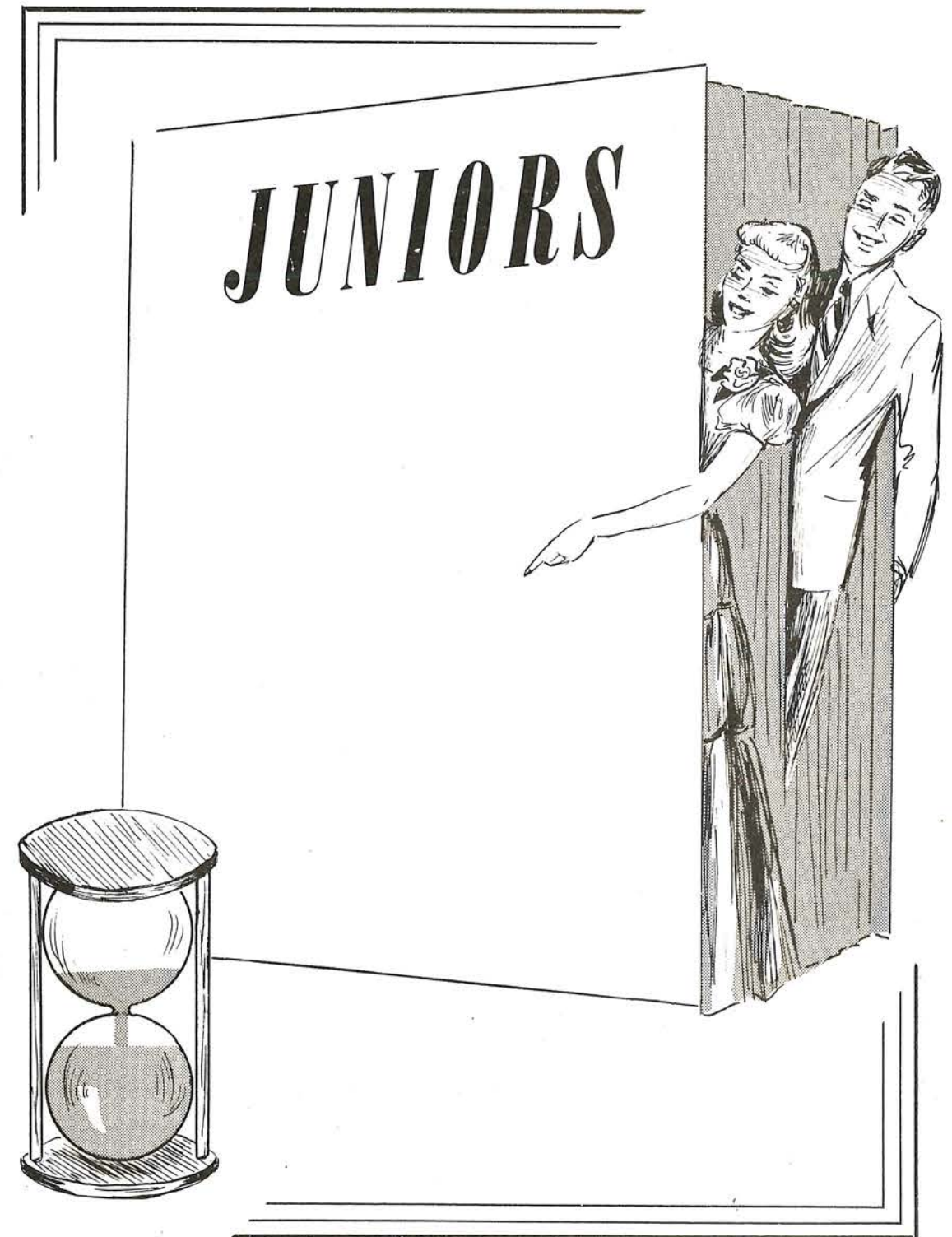
The days began to pass quickly by
