And were sharp as a razor blade.

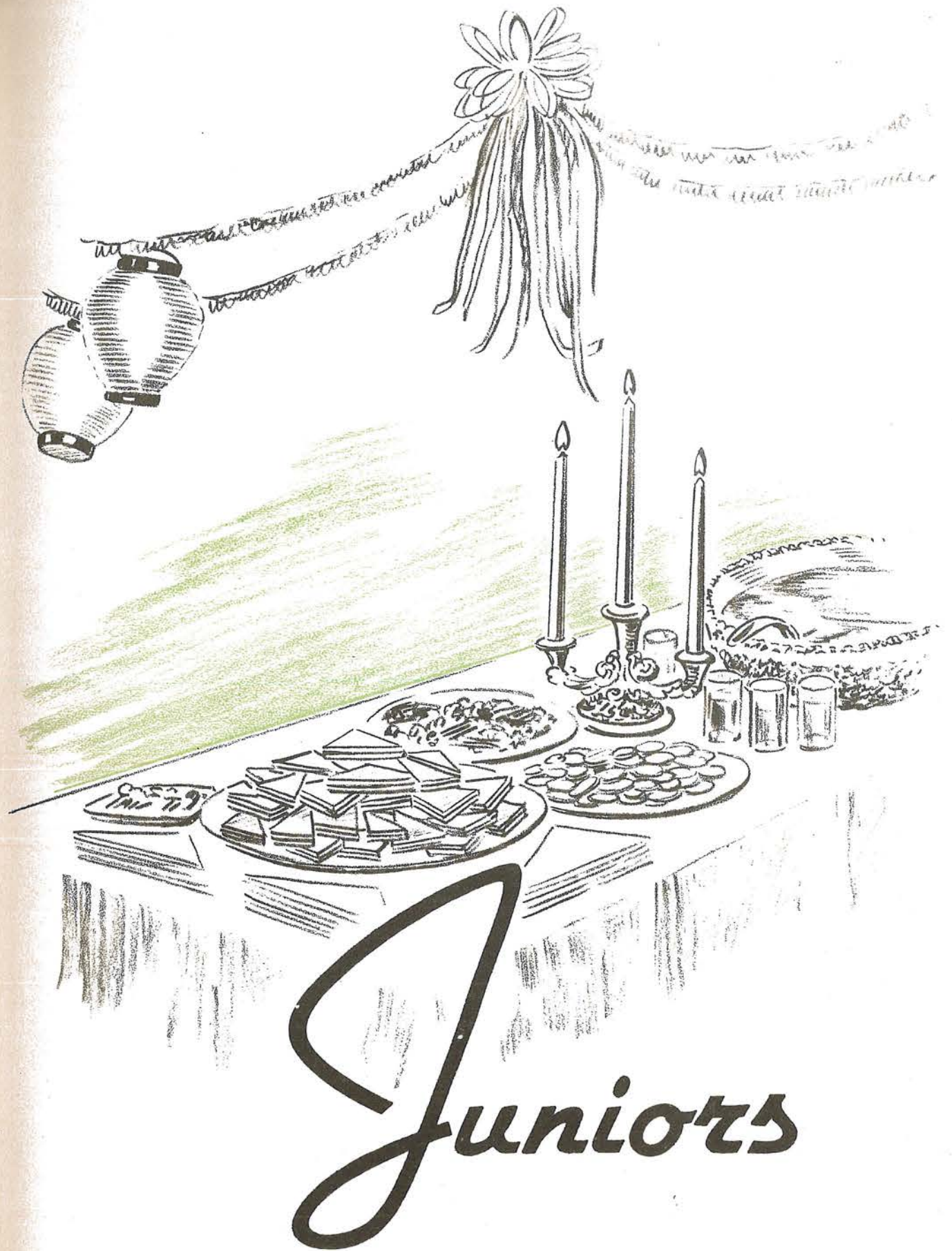
As Sophomores we were glad
