I Hate to Have My Picture Made for the Annual

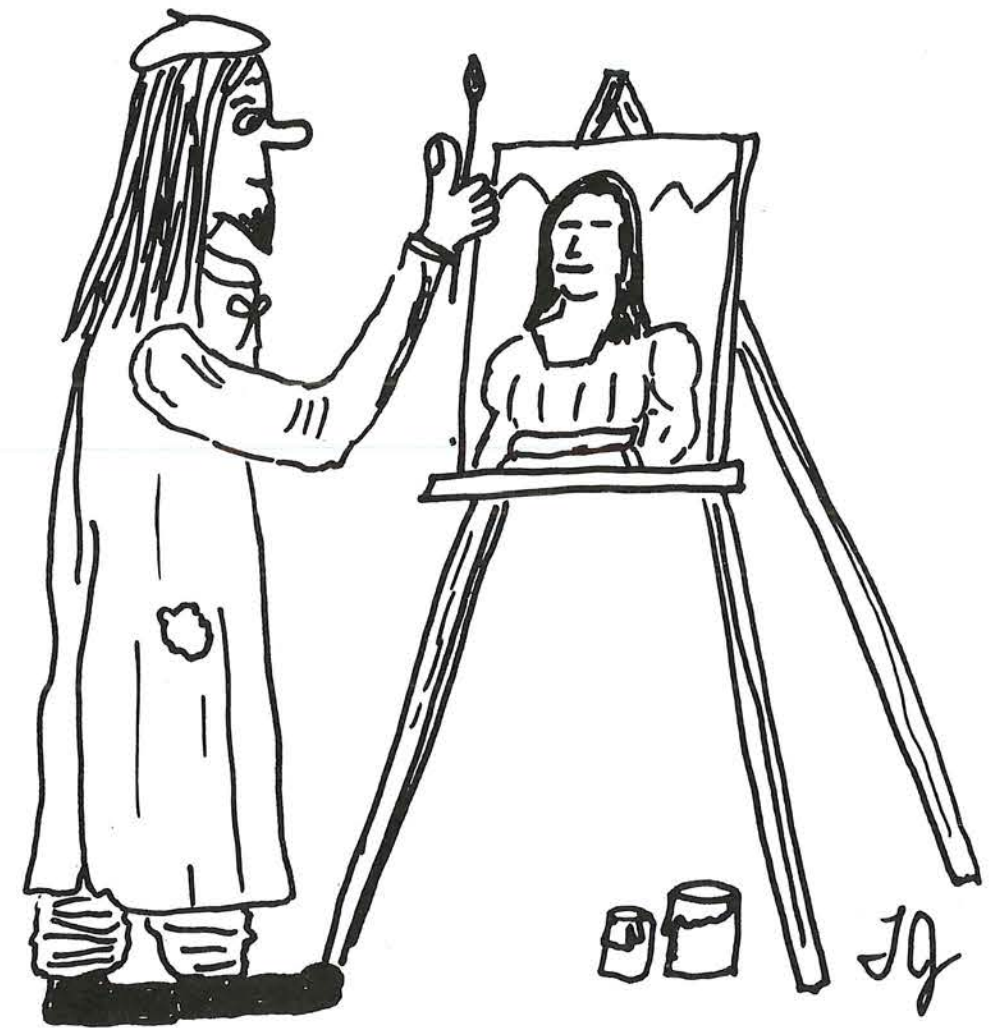
I hate to have my picture made for the annual because . . .
